Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Technology Association of Grantmakers, Inc. (the "Organization") which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Organization and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021 AND 2020

Technology Association of Grantmakers, Inc. (the Organization) is a non-profit corporation incorporated in the state of Florida. The Organization's purpose is to advance the capacities of philanthropic organizations through the use of technology. The Organization qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; accordingly, there is no income tax applicable to its activities.

The governing board approved an amendment to the articles of incorporation pertaining to a name change for the Organization. Effective January 1, 2020, the Organization changed its name from Technology Affinity Group to Technology Association of Grantmakers, Inc.

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual Basis -- The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis.

Cash and Cash Equivalents -- For the statement of cash flows, the Organization includes cash on deposit to be cash and cash equivalents.

Certificates of Deposit -- Certificates of deposit include certificates of deposits with original maturities greater than three months.

Grants Receivable -- Grants receivable, less an appropriate allowance, are reported at their net present value. The Organization provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a provision for bad debt expense and an adjustment to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Management considers all grants receivable to be collectible and, therefore, has not established a provision for uncollectible accounts for the year ended December 31, 2021.

Deferred Revenues -- Membership dues received in advance are recorded as deferred revenue when received and reflected as revenues in the applicable year.

The balance of deferred revenue at December 31, 2021, less any refunds issued will be recognized as revenue over the fiscal year beginning on or after January 1, 2022, as services are rendered.

Revenue and Revenue Recognition -- Revenue is recorded on the accrual basis of accounting. The Organization derives its revenue primarily from member dues, conference fees, and grants. The Organization recognizes revenue from fees during the year in which the related services are provided. The performance obligation of fees is simultaneously received and consumed; therefore, the revenue is recognized in the period earned.

1 <u>Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)</u>

Contributions -- The Organization records contributions of cash and other assets when an unconditional promise to give such assets is received from a donor. Contributions are recorded at the fair value of the assets received and are classified as either without donor restriction or with donor restriction, depending on whether the donor has imposed a restriction on the use of such assets.

Net Assets -- Net assets, revenues, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor or grantor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions -- Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor or grantor restrictions.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions -- Net assets subject to donor or grantor imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Gifts of long-lived assets and gifts of cash restricted for the acquisition of long-lived assets are recognized as revenue when the assets are placed in service. Contributions restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire in the reporting period when the revenue is recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported on the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Functional Allocation of Expenses -- The costs of program and supporting services activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. The statement of functional expenses presents the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Use of Estimates -- The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

1 <u>Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)</u>

Income Taxes -- The Organization is exempt from income tax under IRC section 501(c)(3), though it is subject to tax on income unrelated to its exempt purpose, unless that income is otherwise excluded by the Code. The Organization has processes presently in place to ensure the maintenance of its taxexempt status; to identify and report unrelated income; to determine its filing and tax obligations; and to identify and evaluate other matters that may be considered tax positions. The Organization has determined that there are no material uncertain tax positions that require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

2 <u>Liquidity</u>

The Organization has certain donor-restricted assets limited to use which are available for general expenditure within one year in the normal course of operations. Accordingly, these assets have been included in the qualitative information above for financial assets to meet general expenditures within one year.

As part of the Organization's liquidity management plan, cash in excess of daily requirements is invested in short-term investments.

3 <u>Concentration of Risk</u>

The Organization maintains its cash and cash equivalents in bank deposit accounts, which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts. Management believes the Organization is not exposed to any significant credit risk related to cash and cash equivalents.

4 <u>Certificates of Deposit</u>

The Organization had a certificate of deposit under the FDIC insured limit of \$250,000. The certificate of deposit bore interest at rate of 0.05% and matured in March, 2021. The value of the certificate of deposit was \$-0- and \$152,661 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

7 Defined Contribution Retirement Savings Plan

During the year ended December 31, 2021, the Organization began sponsoring a defined contribution pension plan that covers substantially all employees who meet the plan requirements. The Organization can choose to make matching contributions to the plan, annually. Pension expense for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 was \$7,947 and \$-0-, respectively.

8 <u>Compensated Absences</u>

Employees of the Organization are entitled to paid vacations, sick days and other time off depending on length of services and other factors. It is impractical to estimate the amount of compensation for future absences and, accordingly, no liability has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements. The Organization's policy is to recognize the costs of compensated absences when paid to employees.

9 <u>Commitments</u>

Annual Conference - 2022

In November, 2018, the Organization signed a contract with Grand Hyatt San Antonio for the annual conference scheduled to take place in November, 2020. The contract included a cancellation agreement indicating that the Organization may not cancel the contract for any reason except Force Majeure, without incurring damages. During the year ended December 31, 2020, the contract was amended to move the date of the event to November, 2022. There were no charges incurred for amending the contract. According to the amended contract, the Organization will be held liable if the contract is cancelled after the contract signing date. If the contract is cancelled from January 1, 2022 to April 30, 2022, the Organization is liable for \$117,024. If the contract is cancelled from May 1, 2022 to November 13, 2022, the Organization is liable for \$186,032. Management of the Organization has no intention to cancel the contract as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Annual Conference - 2023

In June, 2019, the Organization signed a contract with Grand Hyatt Nashville for the annual conference scheduled to take place in November, 2021. The contract included a cancellation agreement indicating that the Organization may not cancel the contract for any reason except Force Majeure, without incurring damages. In March, 2021, the contract was amended to move the date of the event to November, 2023. The Organization was charged \$5,000 for amending the contract. According to the amended contract, the Organization will be held liable if the contract is cancelled after the contract signing date. If the contract is cancelled from the date of signing to November 5, 2022, the Organization is liable for \$53,138. If the contract is cancelled from November 6, 2022 to May 9, 2023, the Organization is liable for \$371,968. If the contract is cancelled from August 8, 2023 to November 5, 2023, the Organization is liable for \$483,607. Management of the Organization has no intention to cancel the contract and, therefore, has not recognized a liability.

Consulting Services

During the year ended December 31, 2021, the Organization entered into a commitment for consulting services. The commitment is for services to be rendered through May, 2022. The Organization expects to pay an additional \$31,700 for these services during the year ending December 31, 2022.

10 Subsequent Events

The Organization has evaluated all subsequent events through October 24, 2022, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
